All pictures viewed clockwise from top left -

1. The chancel from the north.
2. The quoins seen rising (right) in pic.1 are again seen here at the left of this picture, and the walling running out to the buttress (right) is the east end of the north aisle. This was the east wall of the Saxon north porticus. The stepped plinth is seen clearly here.

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This page: pictures showing the crypt under the chancel.

The church was founded as an abbey for men & women in the 7th century. The Saxon work extant comprises crypt, crossing and transepts. The walls of



crypt and chancel show two separate building periods, the commencement being the church that received St.Guthlac about 698.
